

Colour in, cut out and decorate your class tree.

The Ash tree is Ireland's most common and tallest native tree. Its flat, broad leaves grow opposite each other in pairs on a long stem.

The seeds of the Ash tree provide food for wildlife such as birds, mice and squirrels.





Rowan trees usually grow between ten and twenty metres high.

Their leaflets grow either side of the stem and in the autumn, it produces red berries. These berries are a great source of food for those birds who are lucky enough to get to them so high up.









Colour in, cut out and decorate your class tree.

The Holly tree is a small tree and doesn't usually grow over 1 metre in height. That's just over 3 big ruler lengths.

Its bright red berries are a great source of food for animals during winter. Can you think of anywhere else where Holly is used? It's used around a very special time of the year.





The Scots Pine tree can live for up to 200 years, and there's even a Scots Pine in Sweden that's nearly 700 years old.

The Scots Pine's leaves look like the scales of a small reptile, but when grown fully, they appear as silver-green needles. Be careful if you're playing near them as these needles can be prickly to touch!
